Honors Endeavors: Term 1

Reading Endeavor: The Plot Thickens!

Instructions:

- 1. Choose a book that falls under one of the following genres:
- *Mystery

OR

*Adventure

Your book must be AT LEAST 150 pages.

2. Read the book. You will be given 10-15 minutes every day in class to read. You will also need to read at home if you want to finish in time. Take advantage of extra time in class when you have finished assignments as well.

*As you read, pay attention to how the author uses the plot structure and plot elements in his/her book. Does the plot follow the exact plot pyramid formula? What are the different character POVs in the story? Also, how does the title of the book tie-in with the rest of the story?

3. Bring your book with you on the date of the in-class essay; you will need it in order to cite text evidence. You will be given the entire class period to complete your essay.

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Writing Endeavor: I'm an Author!
Instructions:

You are going to write your own short story to show what you have learned about plot and narrative elements. It can be any genre you would like, and it can be a fictional story or be a personal narrative. You get to choose! Follow these steps to help you as you write your story:

- 1. Brainstorm ideas for your story. Is it going to be a more realistic story, or will it be fantasy? Is it going to follow the plot pyramid structure exactly, or will you play around with the structure and other narrative elements?
- 2. Write a rough draft of your story. Your final story should be around 3-5 pages (please no longer than 10 pages). Make sure you use good details to describe your setting and characters, and to help create the mood of your story.
- 3. Go through your story and revise it. Add more details, fix confusing parts, rework anything that needs to be reworked. Feel free to have others read your story to give you feedback, but remember, you make all final decisions for your story at the end of the day.
- 4. Edit your story for grammar, conventions, and spelling. Make sure you check for all of those typos!
- 5. Submit your story by uploading it to Canvas. I will be taking everyone's stories and putting them together into an anthology for others to read and enjoy.

*If you want your story to remain anonymous for the anthology, that is fine. You may use a pen name for yourself. Just make sure you tell me what it is. **Due:** 10/19/16

Ideas for your story:

*What is one of your bad habits? Invent a character who has the bad habit, but a much worse case of it than you have. Write about the trouble this character would get into.

*Write about an unlikely superhero (i.e. Platypus Man, Uncontrollable Hiccups Boy, Super-Grandma).

*Your character discovers that they can hear the voices of the dead over the radio? How do they discover this? Who would they talk to?

*You fall asleep one night and find yourself in a dream that you cannot wake up from. What is it? And how will you snap back to reality?
